



OPERATING BUDGET


McCallie's budget is the financial translation of the school's day-to-day priorities and activities that accomplish the mission of the school.

Our three main revenue streams - enrollment, endowment, and Honor Fund are strong because of the trust that our community and alumni place in us. This is good because our three main expenses - salaries, benefits, and physical plant upkeep are incredibly important. These three main expenses reflect McCallie's commitment to its faculty who invest their lives in our students and the spaces in which they do their transformative work with boys.

Another significant priority in the school's operating budget is financial aid; 55% of boarding students and 40% of day students receive financial aid.

FACILITIES

Just as the school's first capital gift, the contribution of 40 acres of land and Founders Home by the McCallie family, was vital to McCallie's start, giving for capital projects remains a top priority. Each of the school's buildings represent a previous generation of McCallie alumni paying forward the life-changing experiences they had at McCallie. As former Head of School Spencer McCallie '55 often said, "We drink from wells we did not dig."

In addition to the jointly-owned GPS-McCallie Rowing Center which was opened a few years ago, McCallie has two significant capital projects underway. In spring of 2023, the first 8 of 16 new faculty townhouses will be ready for faculty families to move in. These townhomes are a tremendous addition to our campus housing options. We also anticipate our new Squash, Lifetime Fitness, and Outdoor Center will open in the fall of 2023, providing much-needed tailored space to our strong squash and outdoor programs.

It is worth remembering that the school's facilities come with significant operational and renewal costs. Facilities expenditures are second only to faculty compensation in McCallie's budget. Our facilities team does an incredible job of keeping our campus beautiful and maintained with multiple buildings spread out over many acres. Yet, the independent boarding school environment is highly competitive and offering exceptional, modern, wellmaintained facilities to support our program is essential.

What is PPRRSM? Pronounced prism, PPRRSM is an acronym that stands for Provision for Plant Replacement, Renewal, and Special Maintenance. The PPRRSM budget is used for major capital expenditures such as roofs and HVAC systems, as well as for reimagining spaces that have outlived their use. One recent example of a PPRRSM transformation is the Center for Animation, Video, and Entertainment (the CAVE), the lower level of the academic center.

ENDOWMENT

McCallie's Board of Trustees approved the establishment of the Founders' Fund in 1959 as its first endowment fund. Funded by 72 original donors, the proceeds were designated by the Board to be used annually to give mission-appropriate boys in need the ability to attend McCallie.

What is an endowment? Endowments are funds held in perpetuity and invested to provide long-term income. McCallie has two types of endowment: a permanent endowment established by donor giving and a board-designated endowment in which funds, such as unrestricted bequests, have been invested. These types of unrestricted


gifts allow the school to be flexible when unfavorable economic conditions strike and to be bold in the advancement of the school's strategic imperatives during periods of favorable economic conditions.

An endowment's corpus cannot be spent by the school. Instead, only a small percentage can be spent annually from the fund's earnings. While McCallie's net endowment is valued at \$\$117.2 million as of June 30, 2022, the draw from McCallie's endowment is substantially less: \$7.3 million.

In comparison with many of our peer institutions, McCallie was late to establish an endowment and as a result we lag behind these schools in this important benchmark. We are grateful for the donors who have committed legacy gifts to the future of McCallie's endowment so that we can be more competitive on a national level.

McCallie's endowment experienced a decline in value during fiscal year 2021–22 due to global market declines. The portfolio is diversified to offer downside protection, and as a result, our market losses for the fiscal year are in line with our benchmarks and are lower than the overall decline in the S&P.

CONTINUING THE CYCLE OF GENEROSITY

I was very fortunate to attend McCallie. With both of my parents working at GPS, we went to McCallie football games on Fridays, and I started McCallie Day Camp at a young age. When it came time to decide on middle school, I had several close friends attending McCallie, and it seemed like the best natural fit for me.

I spent 6 years at McCallie, and developed friendships that I still cherish today. They have been with me throughout the highs and lows in life, and I'm grateful that we had such an amazing, nurturing environment to develop those relationships.

While I really enjoyed my experiences in the classroom, the main thing that I loved at McCallie was competing in sports. I was fortunate to be part of great teams led by amazing coaches in baseball, football, and wrestling. In playing sports, I learned how to be on a team, support my teammates, and how to deal with adversity. These skills have become invaluable life lessons for me; you just can't put a price tag on them. I was grateful to have coaches who fostered connection with one another and who taught us to win and lose gracefully.

I also loved the day-boarding aspect of McCallie. During my time there, I had a lot of friends who were boarding students. My parents always had an open door policy and were happy to have boys Blue Slip to our house for the weekend. Other times, friends would have dinner with us on Sunday nights. Getting to know the boarding students was a great opportunity to learn about people from different parts of the world and different cultures. I felt blessed to be around such a diverse group at a relatively young age. It was an awesome experience.

At McCallie I really developed an appreciation for English class. There are so many things that I enjoy today in my spare time because I was led by awesome teachers. When I came to McCallie, I couldn't stand reading, but, when you are taught by teachers like Bill Boyd, Michael Bailey, Chet LeSourd, and some of the others, you develop a passion for poetry, Southern Literature, plays, and novels. I learned to even enjoy Shakespeare. These teachers' passion for what they taught was contagious, and they were able to make the content relatable to us. I feel blessed to have been able to experience that. They led each one of us down our own path of discovery.

When I used to read things on my own, I would have a very limited view of what it looked like or how to interpret it. But, when guided by great teachers, their experience and expertise trained me to see things that I'd never seen before. The depth that I was able to reach in my understanding led to more appreciation for the value of what reading could be, and this richer understanding made me want to read more. When you have someone who can open your eyes to the full picture of reading, literature, poetry, drama, you learn that all offer a completely unique and satisfying story.

It wasn't all fun. There were some strict routines that we had to endure, like Bill Boyd on grammar, but I can't begin to tell you how well that grammar instruction has served me. English is undersold, and I can confidently say that I learned to read critically and write effectively through my English classes at McCallie. When I went to University of Georgia, I was well-equipped to tackle their English classes.

McCallie taught me so much more than what was in the curriculum. For instance, I still take notes in business meetings the way that Terry Evans taught me to take notes when I was in 7th grade science. I still push myself the way Ralph Potter and Wayne Reynolds would push me on the football field. I try to show grace the way Hank Hopping did toward me when I really screwed up my junior year. Even in emails today, I try to write the same way that Chet LeSourd taught me to frame arguments. All of these little things shape who you are, who you become. These are things that I keep with me all the time. They are part of who I am. My course in life as well as my ethics were shaped by the many positive experiences I had at McCallie.

I am biased, but I do think when you are in a single sex education environment like McCallie, you develop a much tighter bond and brotherhood with friends than you do at a co-ed school. My friends and I literally did everything together, and there were very few guard rails up between us because it was all guys. We had no problem cutting up, teasing one another, or talking about things that were important to us. The all-boy environment took a whole different element or complication out of the picture so that we really felt more comfortable at a deeper level with each other. Each of us could be our more true or real self, especially during those formative years of middle school and high school. The ability to share things with good friends really made a healthy impact in my life and that was enhanced because of the all-boy environment.

The years one spends at McCallie are so formative. It is important to know in life who you are and those years at McCallie are, in large part, about figuring out who you are. When you have coaches and teachers pouring into you their wisdom, experiences, and insights as well as their care and encouragement, that builds your self-esteem, and builds a reservoir of things you carry with you for life. This shaping and molding creates confidence and feeds your own ability to believe in yourself. It creates characteristics and attributes that you carry with you into other relationships further down the line, whether it is with new friends at college, or dealing with girls, or

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getting your first job. All of the things that are waiting for you beyond McCallie benefit from the self-knowledge and self-confidence gained in those formative years. Good friendships, having the liberty of being one's self and of being appreciated for your own unique qualities are critical. I'm thankful that McCallie helped give me such a positive head start in life.

Coming out of McCallie, the University of Georgia was different because it is such a big school. Kids were coming from Atlanta in droves with maybe 100 kids from one high school. It all felt a little cliquey at first, but it was a great opportunity to be outside of my comfort zone. I roomed with Steven Levitt '03 that first year, which was awesome and helped make the transition easier. On the academic front, I felt very prepared as McCallie had taught me how to study and how to be disciplined. A lot of the entry level curriculum in math and English was not foreign because we had been so deeply exposed at McCallie. I ended up really enjoying my time at Georgia.

I started giving to McCallie's Honor Fund in 2003 because McCallie made a huge impact on me. I have always felt fortunate to have the experience that I did at McCallie, and I was always conscious that I would not have had the opportunity to attend McCallie in the first place if it weren't for someone else's generosity. The kindness and grace from people, who I may never meet, ended up changing my life. I wanted to begin that process of giving to further someone else's future early.

When you boil it down, I think a lot at McCallie has changed over the years, but to me the core elements have not changed. Honor, Truth, and Duty and "Man's chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy Him forever" - those haven't changed. As long as these cornerstones are still intact, McCallie is true to itself. McCallie can be the same and different at the same time. It can be true to itself while maintaining the innovative and relevant sense of progress that is necessary to be at the forefront. It is also good to change the culture to be more inclusive, diverse, and more positive for everyone. McCallie has been good about adapting without changing its core values.

It is easy to look around McCallie and think that they don't need my support. McCallie has immaculate facilities. They have the best teachers and staff, which is certainly no accident. But, I know that a significant portion of students have great financial need. I will likely never know who I help, but I am so thankful that somebody so graciously gave to help me. I am happy to do the same for the next generation of students. McCallie is something that changed my life. I feel passionate about McCallie and the impact it had on me. I am honestly glad to give what I can, as someone did for me. It is a virtuous cycle. Some gave for me, transformed me, and I try to be a good steward of what my Heavenly Father has entrusted to me. We are called to be a good steward of the resources that were given to us and, now, our role is to pass it on to the next generation.

McCALLIE, LIFE LESSONS, AND SQUASH

I started as a 7th grade student. I did not have long ties to McCallie, but I did have an older brother who went there. Hanging out with him and his friends, going to McCallie-Baylor football games, and being on campus with him when I was a 4th, 5th, and 6th grader just prepared me that going to McCallie would be the logical next step for me.

Growing up, tennis was my main sport even when I was in elementary school. My dad was a tennis player so he started me out at a pretty young age. I tried out for the football team at the beginning of 7th grade. My dad found out about it when he got a bill for the pads and he asked me, Mike, what is this all about? I told him that I might join the football team and he promptly said, I don't think so; you are a tennis player. So, that was the end of my football career before it really even started. I tried basketball, wrestling, and other things because McCallie really pushed us to be well-rounded. But, ultimately, tennis was my sport and my passion.

Nothing was given to us at McCallie. Everything had to be earned. I was not a naturally gifted student or athlete. When I wanted to get a good result, I learned that it took hard work and that I had to really invest myself. One example of this was my erroneous assumption that I would start on the varsity tennis team because I had been playing tennis for such a long time. Then, in 9th grade, some really good players who were boarding students came in. I realized that there were upperclassmen who had been playing tennis longer than me, or were just better at it than me. This was a wake up call. I figured out that if I wanted to make the varsity team I was going to have to dig deep. Of course, that lesson transferred to other endeavors as well, like academics. I learned this ethic of hard work by progressing through McCallie and it has served me well.

It took me a while after graduating to give credit to McCallie for instilling life lessons in me. Then, one day, I did understand that the environment at McCallie was set up to help me learn lessons like the value of hard work, how to overcome adversity, and what it means to have a moral center. Everywhere you looked at McCallie, people were working hard to fulfill their goals. Upperclassmen and faculty who were both good role models. Watching how hard they worked helped me learn that things don't come easy. I learned that the more you put into something, the more you will get out of it. I have found this to be true in athletics, scholastics, and even in friendships and relationships.

Having a son and a daughter in school makes you look back at your own adolescence and reflect on what shaped you. That is really what got me connected back with McCallie. I realized that I learned so much from McCallie when I sent my son there. Watching him go through the process of growing up, making a mistake or two here and there, I saw the realization set in for him that nothing is going to be given to him. He learned he was going to have to go talk to his teachers if he wanted his grades to be better. He would have to learn through working with them what he could do, then execute on it.

My feeling when I was graduating from McCallie was out with the old and in with the new. McCallie was my past and college was the new. I thought at college everything would



be better and bigger and that no one would tell me what I had to do all the time. The truth was that you did get dropped off at college. You were left to sink or swim. I was glad that McCallie prepared me to actually manage myself and manage the responsibilities that were before me. I didn't fully appreciate that preparedness at the time or recognize that it came from my time at McCallie. But, I am fully appreciative now, as an adult, that I learned how to be goal-driven, that I am the type of person who wants to do well, that I know how to hold myself accountable.

My first job was in a restaurant in Charleston. The work ethic, accountability, and interpersonal skills that I learned at McCallie led me to be successful at that job, which gave me the opportunity to have a career in the restaurant business. Being in the restaurant business in Charleston was like pursuing a career and being in graduate school at the same time. We were all pretty young and inexperienced. We

focused on working hard, being polite, and having great customer service. We believed that focusing on these elements would lead us to the right place. Later, I connected the dots to realize that the culture of hard work, great morals, being a good person, caring about people, and listening to people are lessons learned in my adolescence years. I am super thankful and fortunate to have been steered in the right direction through such a great community like McCallie. When you are immersed in that kind of community, when you grow up in that kind of community, and then commit to spreading that kind of community through your own life, vou can't help but move forward. Eventually, I moved home and began opening restaurants in Chattanooga.

I mentioned before that I have a background in a racquet sport – tennis. I discovered squash when I visited my brother who was doing his medical residency in New Jersey and at Mount Sinai in New York City. He and his friends had

started playing squash and invited me to check it out. I don't know why I liked it except that it was something familiar but different at the same time. I also had a lot of fun playing with my brother. So, I started playing squash with some friends in Chattanooga. We were enjoying it as a way to blow off some steam after work, to get some exercise, and to generally stay healthy. It was certainly more fun than getting on a treadmill. So, we played and played. We thought that we had gotten really good so we entered a tournament in Atlanta. We went to Atlanta and the courts were different. Our court in Chattanooga was kind of makeshift but it was what we were used to. Long story short, we all got beat really badly in the tournament. So much so that it motivated us to learn more about squash and to get an official court.

I was married by this time and my wife, Taylor, and I were playing a lot of squash, enjoying the fact that it is a lifetime sport. We agreed that one day we would like our kids to learn how to play squash, and if we had the opportunity one day, we would build a squash club in Chattanooga. Luckily, down the road we were able to build that squash club in Chattanooga, Scenic City Squash. It has been a lot of fun turning people on to something that they've never heard of. There have been lots of smiles and laughs in the process.

Three or four years later I approached McCallie about a squash program because of their previous success in trailblazing other sports, like crew and lacrosse. The timing of me being passionate about growing squash, having a son at McCallie, having seen McCallie grow other sports – it just all came together at the same time. I remembered my days of working hard to make that varsity tennis team, and I thought how great it would be to develop squash as a sport where boys would be motivated to get good enough to make the varsity squash team. I would be part of creating the circumstances and environment at McCallie to spread that ethic of hard work that has meant so much to me. The day that Head of School Lee Burns and I met, I knew McCallie was the perfect place to really kick start squash and turn it into something big.

Today it's amazing what McCallie has done for the sport of squash, what I've been able to do, and the smiles on the kids' faces when they come to our club to practice and play. They're always thankful, respectful, and all of them come up to me all the time to say Mr. Monen, we wouldn't ever play squash if it weren't for you. That's just a good feeling, and who knows where that might take any number of them.

There are over 100 kids who try out each year for the tennis team at McCallie, and there are not 100 spots on the team. There are only 6 positions on the tennis team. Having squash as a racquet sport alternative that they can be good at is a really good thing for the players, and for the school. I have been involved in getting a squash facility on the McCallie campus. I reached out to my former tennis teammates. I focused on our memories of how great it was being on those tennis teams together, how great it was working hard together, and how much that camaraderie and hard work taught us. They all knew firsthand the competition to land a spot on the tennis team and what a difference having an alternative route to that team experience would mean. Offering squash and having world class facilities would be giving another opportunity for kids to excel.

It was not a far leap to see that McCallie can have the best coaches and facilities that you can build. But, the culture of excellence is created by the players. You get some kids who are leaders and they shape the team. They model leadership and a solid work ethic, and the other boys learn what it looks

like and sounds like to be a leader. In turn, they internalize what leadership is, and they model it for boys younger than them. Getting a core group of boys with a good attitude and work ethic grounds the culture. I work as a part time coach with the squash team and have seen this happen. Each year the culture of hard work and determination gets stronger and the team keeps setting its sights on higher goals each year. This year they are determined to win a national championship. My son is getting to be a part of that and is getting involved in the culture of setting a goal and working hard to achieve it.



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Hopefully in the fall of 2023, the school will open the Squash, Lifetime Fitness, and Outdoor Center, which will house 8 squash courts. That means another 60-80 boys are going to have an opportunity to learn and play a lifetime sport, will learn to work hard, and will experience excelling as a team at McCallie. They will remember that McCallie gave them that opportunity, and who knows, one day they may give back something important to McCallie and bring something impactful to their communities. It brings me great joy to have a little part in impacting the lives of kids as they are growing up and making their way through their adolescence and through McCallie.

McCallie is a great community that puts out great people who do great things. I wouldn't have predicted that I would do this squash thing, but we have.

HOW THE MICHAELS-DICKSON SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM GOT STARTED

I grew up in Monroeville, a small town in Alabama. My dad was in the textile industry. When he and my mother began looking into the high school there, they found out that Monroeville County High School didn't have any algebra beyond Algebra I, no foreign language instruction, and some other deficiencies in the curriculum. They had the good sense of looking into some boarding schools for me.

Ultimately, they let me choose between Darlington, McCallie, and one other. I chose McCallie. I attended McCallie as a boarding student for 3 years and had a marvelous experience. I learned a lot about studying and academic preparation. I learned a lot about sports. I wasn't much of a jock, but I finally made the last position on the tennis team my senior year. My ability to get along with a wide range of boys blossomed. I would also say my faith was moderate; it was strengthened at McCallie.

After graduating from McCallie, I ended up going to the University of North Carolina. Then, I went to Uncle Sam's finishing school. After being in Vietnam for a year, I came back and attended Harvard for business school. After my time at Harvard, I got a job with McKinsey and Company, the firm that I was with for 32 years. My wife, Joanie, and I moved to Los Angeles with McKinsey. I am convinced that I would not have gotten an offer from McKinsey had it not been for the very good grounding that I got in math at McCallie. When I had one of my McCallie reunions, I drove onto campus and a flood of memories came back. In that moment, I realized that McCallie was truly a huge part of who I was.

When we moved to Atlanta, Curtis Baggett '65 from McCallie came to visit me. Our time together made me reflect on what McCallie had been to me. I got to wondering if there was anything that I could do for McCallie. The idea of a math chair came up because I had three wonderful math teachers at McCallie. They didn't just teach me math; they taught me how to think and approach issues quantitatively. Quantitative thinking played into my success both at business school and in my career at McKinsey.

If we could raise some money, I thought we could create a chair to honor McCallie math teachers. Curtis said we would need \$500,000, which was a lot of money in 1970. I didn't have that kind of money. He said that all we would have to do was to get 20 people to give \$25,000 each, which could be divided into \$5000 a year for 5 years. When I thought about it that way, I told him that I thought I could do that. I went out and recruited friends. Everyone that I contacted agreed to \$25,000, most over 5 years. We raised the money and did a national search for a wonderful new math chair holder. We ended up concluding that the best recipient was right there at McCallie, Lance Nickel, who was a terrific teacher and



well regarded. That was my introduction to philanthropy at McCallie. I have continued to support McCallie in other things like the expansion of Hutcheson dorm, and most notably, the Michaels-Dickson Scholars program.

I remember having lunch with one of my lifelong friends, Charlie Battle '60, who was head of the Senate and the Grayson Medal winner at McCallie. He was also a Morehead Scholar at UNC; I was not. We remarked to one another what a great thing the Morehead Scholarship had been for UNC and the Jefferson had been for UVA. Some time later, I was out jogging, coming up a big hill and literally, God gave me the instinct that McCallie could, and should, have a similar scholarship program that would yield the same strengthening benefits that those programs had done for UNC and UVA. The more I thought about it, it made sense to me and I got really excited about it. I called Curtis and he suggested that we go visit Alan Dickson '49 in Charlotte, who was a McCallie alumnus and head of the Morehead Foundation for UNC. Alan was a busy guy, and a big wheel in Charlotte. Curtis managed to book 45 minutes with him. Alan ended up canceling his afternoon appointments and talked with us for over two hours. He was taken with the idea of a similar scholarship at McCallie. He immediately saw what a huge impact this could have on McCallie in a lot of different ways.

Alan's hot button was that McCallie ended up getting a lot of boys who didn't really want to be at McCallie. They struggled academically, or with behavioral issues, resulting in the class just not being very strong. Alan proved his point by looking at where students went to college. Not all went into tier 1, 2, or 3 schools. Alan thought that was a really important realization, and so did I. We both thought we could attract other boys from around the country who were more like the

top third of the class that McCallie already had. We thought we could attract them not just from the southeast, or just close to Chattanooga. We thought McCallie could attract students from all over the country, if not the world, with the right incentives. I suggested we figure out how much this type of scholarship program would cost. We figured it would cost \$8M to have the means to fund a sizable cohort of students. I wondered where in the world we could get that kind of money. Alan's response was this: don't worry about it for a minute, Ed. Big ideas attract big money. This is a huge idea for McCallie and we will raise a lot of money. We will raise the \$8M, if not more. His conviction gave me the confidence to go to the McCallie Board of Trustees and propose this program.

We formed a little development committee. I said I would raise \$4M and Alan said he would raise \$4M. After we shared our idea with the McCallie Board of Trustees. two board members each committed to giving \$1M. Their enthusiasm gave us the confidence to move forward, but more importantly, their commitment and endorsement validated the program for every other potential investor. They were also convinced that this type of merit-based scholarship program was going to make McCallie a better, stronger school for day and boarding students by getting more academically strong and leadership-oriented boys to McCallie. I called on a good friend of mine, who said it was not a good time for him, even though he was very enthusiastic about the program. I remembered that he went to McCallie on a full-ride scholarship. I called him back the next morning and told him that I wholeheartedly believed contributing to this program was the right thing to do. He said I was just testing your resolve and belief in the program. He went on to say that \$8M is not enough, that we ought to raise \$10M and that he would

give us more than the million we asked for. We only had 10 or 12 prospects and no one turned us down. Alan Dickson ended up raising \$5M, as did I. That got us started.

The Michaels-Dickson Scholarship program has been very successful for McCallie. We were pleased by how much the faculty embraced it. They appreciated the program for bringing in a new caliber of student, which made it more exciting, fun, and rewarding for them to teach. It became easier for teachers to get boys to perform well academically. Boys could see that the guy on their right and the guy on their left were very serious about their studies, so there was a new dynamic in the classroom. The quality of the boys that we attracted was amazing.

When we had the first Michaels-Dickson Scholars Weekend, about 18 or 20 boys and their families attended. Alan and I thought that we were going to pick two full ride boys and that was going to be it. Steve Hearn'74, director of admission at the time, came to us and said it would be a mistake to do that. He explained that these boys were unbelievably talented and that each needed financial aid in the amount that their family qualified for so each of these boys could attend McCallie. He said we had to find some more money because this was going to have a profound impact on the school. Steve was right and that is how the program has allocated their awards since. Instead of getting two great boys, we decided to allocate partial funding and got a whole lot of great boys.

Over the years, the MDS program has grown in prestige and has transformed the quality of the typical McCallie student. We learned from the beginning of the program that the applicants we were attracting were not only academically strong, they also showed themselves to have deep leadership potential. They were boys of high character. As long as we could continue to find the money and the boys each year, there was not doubt that this program would have a transformative effect on McCallie. Over time, the program has strengthened the student body. This program was honestly successful from that first year. To this day the MDS program continues to attract from 12 to 20 boys a year who are top notch.

One of the unique aspects of the MDS program is that it removes any stigma from receiving financial aid. By and large, MDS recipients are not highlighted as being merit scholarship winners. They are folded seamlessly into their class. What you see is a different type of ownership and work effort that they embody because they have competed and earned their place at McCallie. Through the MDS program process, they have thought about how they intend to stand out and how

they will perform. They view the opportunity of attending McCallie from the beginning differently than others who take their place at McCallie somewhat for granted. MDS boys leave McCallie and go on to some of the best colleges and universities in the country. They are successful in their educational careers and in their lives.

Since we are just now celebrating our 25th anniversary, the members of those first few cohorts are in their early 40s. These talented men have already had an untold impact on their families and in their careers. There is guite a bit of talent, good will, and positive results spread in communities across the country that comes from the impact that McCallie had on these men. As they continue to season in their lives and careers, I predict that they, like I did, will realize how McCallie has transformed their life trajectories and pay it forward for future generations. McCallie will be a beneficiary of their success financially, but not only financially. In future years, many MDS alumni will serve as trustees, be active in fundraising, and will share their enthusiasm for McCallie in ways we cannot predict. This will take some nurturing because these talented men will have many things that they can offer their gifts and talents to. If McCallie is wise, they will be proactive with the MDS alumni to keep them informed about the MDS program and about the school but, in a broader sense, find meaningful ways of getting them involved.

In all of my fundraising efforts, it has been an honor to ask for money for McCallie. McCallie changed my life and my life prospects. It is an honor to help find ways to continue to strengthen McCallie for the generations of boys behind us.

MEMBER OF THE MICHAELS-DICKSON SCHOLARSHIP COHORT

I came to McCallie from a school in Atlanta, where I had been since kindergarten. I was on track to be a lifer and was happy there, I thought. Then, I went to McCallie Sports Camp. I had a blast there and absolutely loved it. I even did some of the camps that they used to do during the winter called McCallie Sports Camp West where we would go on a skiing trip. After my first or second year at Sports Camp, I asked my mom if I could go to school at McCallie. She said no; it's way too expensive.

So, that was that, or so we thought.

When I was in 8th grade, we got this flyer about the Michaels-Dickson Scholars program starting at McCallie. I am sure we were on the mailing list because of Sports Camp. I remember taking the mailer to my mom and saying, Mom look! McCallie has scholarships. So, I went through the application process. I met Ed Michaels '60 at a big event in Atlanta where they were promoting the new program. I got invited to the Michaels-Dickson Scholars Weekend at McCallie. It was great. I went to my sample English class on Saturday with Miles McNiff. My sample math class was with Troy Kemp, who was the lacrosse coach. Overall, it was fantastic. I ended up getting offered the half scholarship which essentially made the McCallie tuition equal to the tuition of my school in Atlanta. My parents couldn't fight that logic and, ultimately, let me come to McCallie. Fast forward 30 years to now and I am an English teacher and head lacrosse coach at McCallie.

As a new 9th grader, I could reset. McCallie offered opportunities other than the ones in which I had become entrenched at my old school. At my old school, I was in band,

and I was expected to be in band for my whole career there. At McCallie, I didn't have to continue band, which I really didn't like that much. If I stayed at my old school, they would have kept me in that band for as long as possible. Wrestling is also a good example. If I had stayed, I would have had to wrestle. I gave up band and wrestling so that I could focus more on playing lacrosse.

I enjoyed the all-boy environment. I liked not having to think about the social pressures of having girls in the classroom. Also, my old school was more financial-comparison oriented. Getting away from that was great. At McCallie, it was much less obvious whose family had what. I don't think financial comparisons matter as much at McCallie.

I learned a lot of lessons about responsibility and ownership from boarding at McCallie. Having to take care of yourself, having to make your bed every day, having to clean up after yourself are all huge life lessons. If you are sloppy, nobody else is going to fix it for you. If you came into my

dorm room back then, everything would look nice and neat, in little piles so I didn't get marks. I was able to have my room clean enough and neat enough by developing my own system by figuring out something that worked for me. So, when I went to college, I was a step ahead of my roommate who was having to figure that stuff out for himself for the first time.

One of the biggest lessons from McCallie was developing relationships with teachers and taking ownership for coming in to talk to teachers about my work, my challenges, and my progress. If I didn't do well on an assignment or was having trouble on a paper, I learned to come in for Backwork. Now, as a teacher, I tell parents that learning to advocate for yourself is one of the biggest ways to take responsibility.

MDS Weekend is still pretty similar now to what it was that first weekend that I attended. Boys still sit in on classes. One of the cool things about that weekend is getting to know the other candidates. I remember all the candidates playing pickup basketball during our downtime in the afternoon. It was nice to have some unstructured social, fun time. Now when my freshman students write journal entries in the fall, many MDS students will write about how they felt comfortable their first night in the dorms because they recognized 5 to 10 guys from their time together at MDS Weekend.

As an alumnus of the Michaels-Dickson Scholars program, I make a concerted effort to go to the MDS Weekend dinner every year. When I can, I will do interviews the next day. I figure that is the least I can do. I also like to go to the parent social after the dinner to meet some of the parents. For parents to be able to meet an adult who came through the program is, for them, like looking into the future to the man who their son will soon enough become. The part of my role that resonates with parents most are all of the different contact points that a boy has with adults at McCallie. I am in contact with boys as a teacher, coach, and dorm faculty. Parents immediately understand that, yes, we are here to coach and teach their sons, but we are also here to be role models. We get to know students in the classroom, on the field, and in the dorm. Boys at McCallie have a lot of adult figures who have an opportunity to speak into their life in a lot of different ways. I think that it is something that separates us from a lot of other schools.

The students who are Michaels-Dickson Scholars tend to have more motivation. Because the MDS student has gone through this whole process, they take ownership. They have earned the opportunity to be at McCallie and are set on making the most of that opportunity. They approach things with more intentionality. They have a feeling of being at McCallie for a purpose, a reason. As their teacher, teaching MDS students is a little bit more that I am guiding them than I am pulling them along. If I am having to push the gas and pull students along, that really drains the energy out of me and sometimes, there is not enough energy to do the finer stuff. But, if the student is the one pushing the gas, I am able to guide them more, and, in effect, teach them how to steer. We are able to go to a higher level.

One of the great things about the program is that people in the school community don't know all of the kids who are MDS recipients. I recognize some of the kids from having been to the dinner and the weekend, but, a lot of times, I won't know if a student is a MDS recipient in my class until they write about it. There is not this big divide between MDS guys and the non-MDS guys.

Having been a McCallie student, I understand the pressures my students are going through. I try to keep the homework that I give to 30 minutes a night and no more because I know that my students have a ton of work in all of their classes, and they have a lot of demand for extracurricular activities, they still want to be a human being and have friends and some downtime. For example, during McCallie-Baylor week, I don't really give homework because homework during that week is not going to get done, so I don't give it. Just knowing the

ebbs and flows of the yearly schedule helps me anticipate when the guys will be able to stretch themselves and do good quality work, and when they might need more time, or more rest. Having gone through it, I am more able to hold the line with my students. So, when a guy comes in and explains that he had a basketball game, and I had this and I had that, and I was just not able to get this assignment finished, I feel able to look them in the eye and say, well did you come in during Backwork? How are you using your free periods? I told you that I am on duty on Tuesday nights in my dorm, you could have come see me then during study hall. Because I did it myself, I feel I am able to have these troubleshooting conversations with students that help them realize it is on them to take responsibility for their own work ethic and success.

If Ed Michaels were sitting here, I would express my gratitude to him for starting the MDS program. I remember hearing the stories of how challenging it was to put this program together - to raise the money for it, to get people behind it, and to really sell the vision of it. I think it has been such a huge culturallyimpactful program. In the classroom and in the dorm, motivating guys can be really tough. If you don't have those motivated in terms of leadership and academics, a lot of guys will default to taking the easy way out. To infuse the student body, especially the boarding population, with guys that are really motivated, guys that care, guys that have a purpose for being here raises the level of the culture on campus in general.

My wife and I are in our 12th year on campus. Going through McCallie and realizing the impact that McCallie has had on my life, I now fully understand that my opportunity did not happen without the investment of other people in the school. I give back to McCallie because I want to give to future students. Most of my giving is sweat equity, but I also give financial support. If you look at how much I give to McCallie, in the grand scheme of things, the number is really insignificant. After all, I am a teacher with three kids. I don't have a ton of money, but I think it is valuable to give for the sake of participation numbers. And, I give to show that



I believe in what we are doing. The culture of giving is what matters the most. The same way that I always try to go to the MDS Weekend dinner, it is not because the food is that much better that night, although it is. I do these things because I genuinely appreciate the opportunity that I was given and continue to enjoy at McCallie. I feel like we all need to do the best we can to bring in the best students that we can, and to make their experience great.

McCallie Prepared Me from day one

The things that stick in my memory most about McCallie happened in my first year there – 7th grade. My 7th grade experience epitomizes what I think McCallie does better than any other school, which is teaching boys how to study and how to learn.

McCallie was not about how to do this or that algebra problem, but how to solve problems logically. It was not about how to write a book report, but how to read a book to understand content and inference. These lessons stick with you for the rest of your life. Things I had to do in college and medical school, I was able to do because of how I was taught, from day one, at McCallie in the 7th grade.

McCallie teachers invest in your being successful, as a student and as a person. They are there for you in whatever way you need. I had Yo Strang for Bible class. He was probably the nicest, sweetest man that ever walked the earth. My parents always laugh because when they went for the first meeting with my teachers, Yo told them how great our class was and how smart we were. Then, they go into Coach Day's class and he tells them just the opposite, that we were unruly and difficult.

I had Bill Boyd for 7th grade English. One early assignment was to read the first three or four chapters of *Johnny Tremain*. We came into class the next morning and he had a pop quiz ready for us. The quiz was one question: In chapter one there are 14 wharves referenced in the city of Boston. Name them all. It was an all or nothing question! This was a slap in the face, but it taught us, from day one, what was expected of us. It taught us, from day one, how to read for detail, how to study, and how to be prepared. Another thing that was a

tremendous show of humanity, and is representative of what the McCallie community means, is worth sharing. As tough as he was, Coach Boyd stayed in close contact with my dad after I graduated. Eventually my dad got sick and became homebound. Coach Boyd and he would talk on the phone multiple times a week. Coach Boyd would come to our house for coffee. When my dad passed away recently, Coach Boyd had become one of his closest friends. You don't get that genuine care at other schools. For me, that relationship is an amazing example of how McCallie stays with you for life.

I am a firm believer that the all-boy environment helps learning. Boys learn differently than girls. I see that with my son and my daughter. I also saw this when I was a student. I took AP Spanish at GPS. The learning environment at GPS was different. Girls were, frankly, a distraction in the classroom, and fewer distractions are better for learning. Boys are also different in terms of how they interact with other students, and how they interact with teachers. At McCallie, you have a whole cadre of teachers who understand that. They are able to take the uniqueness that each boy has and shape it so they get the best out of him. You don't have to worry about saying something that might offend a girl in the class. This frees boys up to be themselves, to discover how they learn best, and to get the most from the experience.

From a social standpoint, having the coordinate program with GPS was an important part of my experience at McCallie. The social interaction that the coordinate program provides helps ease the transition into college. I know having the opportunity to take classes with girls from GPS, especially in the 11th and 12th grades, made transitioning to a co-ed college much easier. I cannot imagine what it would have been like coming from an all-boys school with no female contact going into a very liberal environment in college.

On McCallie's campus, there is this feeling of togetherness that is unparalleled anywhere. My experiences in college don't come close to the community and brotherhood that I felt with my classmates at McCallie. In college, it was nice to have 3 or 4 students ahead of me who were from McCallie. They provided an instant sense of connection because they had a deep understanding of where you came from.

I was best served in college by the confidence I had in who I was, what my values were, and by being comfortable around my friends, classmates, and teammates. These things were developed at my time at McCallie. I worked my tail off at Harvard, but I did not feel that anyone had any better preparation than me. Many of my classmates came from all the big name prep schools in the Northeast, and I didn't feel that I was at any disadvantage whatsoever coming out of McCallie. I believe it goes back to, from day one, McCallie taught us how to study and how to learn. When you combine all the other extracurricular stuff in terms of how many hours you are spending at football practice, or baseball practice, games, and this, that, and the other, you realize that you learned serious time management, too. You are forced to out of necessity. When I played baseball in college that was an even greater commitment and demand on my time. College baseball is 30 to 40 hours a week all year long. There's no break in that, so we really had to work hard to get everything done. We had to look ahead and work ahead. If you had to ask for an extension because you are on a baseball trip, you had to plan ahead. So, I think those skills of time management were probably the most valuable that I had going into college.

My son, Sam '29, was destined for McCallie since the day he went to First Camp in summer. I never pushed him. We never told him that he was going to McCallie. We gave him the opportunity and he ran with it because the campus, the counselors, the summer camp staff, the teachers, and the admission staff do such a great job of connecting with boys. Why would you not want to go to McCallie?

Sam's closet is all blue and it's always been that way since the first time he set foot on campus. When he got his McCallie acceptance letter, he opened it up, read it, and it finally came to the part where it said *Congratulations* in the fourth or fifth line. He let out a war whoop and jumped up and down. Just like my mom and dad trusted McCallie to take me and mold me as a student and as a young man, I trust the school to do the same with my son because McCallie has a proven track record.

I look at how the school has evolved in the last 25 years because of all of the work and help that the alumni, parents, and grandparents contribute to The Honor Fund. It is phenomenal what McCallie has available for my son as a student now. The campus is better, the faculty is more developed, the student body is more developed as a community, and it is a wonderful thing to see. If I can support that and help that continue to evolve and grow, then, who knows what is in McCallie's future. I cannot imagine what McCallie is going to have available for my son's son thirty years from now.

In terms of giving to McCallie, I decided to give what I can from the beginning, to make it a habit, and to just keep doing it. I made my first gift to the school in 1996, the year that I graduated from Harvard. Then, once I got to medical school, even though I had student loans and not a lot of free cash, I kept giving because giving something each year adds up over time.





It has been over 25 years that I have given to McCallie. I learned this when I was informed that I am part of the Campbell Society which is for 25-year donors. But seeing my name on a list is not the reason I give back to the school. It is to maintain McCallie's excellence and to maintain the opportunity that the young kids have. It is also not just for my boy, not just for my classmate's boy. It is for the kid down the street who may not have a chance to come to McCallie otherwise because his mom and dad are working two jobs, and he's a brilliant, motivated kid. But, without financial aid, he would have no opportunity here. I know that when I was a student at McCallie, I was a beneficiary of financial aid. My mom was a nurse administrator and my dad became disabled soon after I started at McCallie. The monetary assistance to stay at McCallie obviously made a huge difference in my life. For me, giving something every year is a way of repaying the opportunity that I was given by paying it forward for someone else.

When my wife and I give to The Honor Fund, I do not put any restrictions on our gift. I trust the school

to do their job and steward the money well. I'm proud of the work that McCallie does in managing everyone's gifts. Clearly the school is moving in the right direction, both from a physical plant standpoint as well as the opportunities students have. I look at everything students can do now. We didn't have all that when I was going through. How many sports are there to choose from now? How many fine arts are there? It's amazing. Look at the athletic center, Walker Hall, the squash facility coming in, the townhouses, and more importantly, the quality and retention of the faculty. The administration can invest in maintaining excellence in faculty, staff, students, and administration because of the commitment of alumni in supporting the school and giving every year.

When my son hopefully graduates from McCallie, I will encourage him to start giving back early and to make it a habit. If everybody in his class starts early and gives regularly, it all adds up. Solid class participation is important. If you are looking for just a few guys in the class to take up the slack for everyone else, just like in football, you will soon be looking out your ear hole because you are going to get blindsided. Everyone doing their part now makes a huge difference down the road.

Giving comes down to the importance that McCallie has to us in our current lives, and is connected to what it did for us when we were 12 to 18 years old. Giving back allows McCallie to continue its mission of developing young boys into men. You look at the business leaders in Chattanooga and all of the other cities across the country where McCallie alumni are making a difference in their fields and in their communities. A significant portion of their success is due to McCallie. The greatest gift we can give back as alumni is to maintain that element of opportunity for deserving young students. Giving children that chance to attend McCallie, to get the experience that it provides, that kind of growth as individuals is one of the most impactful things that I can do for this city and this community. That is what my giving is about.

MY TRANSFORMATIVE McCallie Journey

I have been asked to explain why I am a life-long financial supporter of McCallie, and why I am willing to devote my time to serve as a trustee. In a sense, I backed my way into McCallie. Since the first grade, I had been digging a hole for myself in my suburban Birmingham school system. I was the class clown, creating chaos at every opportunity.

Rarely cracking a book, in classic underachiever form, I had managed to bluff my way through my classes; that is, until the ninth grade, when I encountered Algebra 1. The Big A called my bluff, and I was holding no cards. Before I knew it, I was on the train to McCallie. But, there was a catch. My record wasn't up to McCallie's standards, so, in order to be accepted for the fall term, I had to go to summer school, behave myself, and make a B in Algebra. If I fell short, the next stop was essentially reform school.

Before I arrived at McCallie, I had never seen the place. Suddenly, I found myself surrounded by people I didn't know. For the first time in my life, I had a roommate, a total stranger from a place I'd never been. Worst of all, I knew virtually nothing about Algebra. Nevertheless, there's nothing like impending doom to focus the mind. For the first time ever, I got serious about schoolwork. I paid attention in class. I studied for hours a day. I stayed out of trouble. I made some friends among my fellow inmates. I adapted to my new environment. More to the immediate point, I got my head around Algebra.

In the end, I made the grade and thereby found myself a new home: McCallie School. What's more, I felt an unfamiliar sense of satisfaction and confidence at having met a challenge. I had discovered the rewards of accomplishment. So powerful was my epiphany that it led me to a conscious decision to reinvent myself. I went so far as to change my name, dropping "Skip" to become "Stan", which I retained through college and law school before re-adopting my old nickname upon returning to my home town.

In tenth grade, I set a goal to attend the University of Virginia. Such long-term planning was new to me; however, I had suffered the consequences of the alternative and had no desire to repeat the experience. Also, for the first time, I accepted the challenge of competitive sports. I tried out for basketball; however, I was promptly cut. I was skinny and awkward and had no skills. I needed to find a sport which required only the ability to put one foot in front of the other, a dose of grim determination, and a high tolerance for pain. Naturally, I landed on the cross-country team. In the pain we shared, I made a couple of lifelong friends, plus we won two conference championships in the bargain.



And, yes, I made it to UVA. It was there that I began to appreciate the value of the education McCallie had given me. I found that I had already read every book on my freshman English syllabus. I tested out of Spanish I and II, and went straight to Spanish literature, thereby bypassing all the tedious grammar and vocabulary lessons. As it turned out, I had already taken all my required college freshman courses at McCallie. This allowed me time to pursue some of the extra-curricular activities McCallie didn't offer. Suffice it to say, I was lucky to live through some of those experiences.

If you have read this far, you may have an inkling why I have remained loyal and grateful to McCallie for all these years. Yet there's more to it than meets the eye. Over the course of time, I have come to realize the value of the culture in which I spent three of the most important formative years in every young man's life. I was expected to be responsible for myself. I was held accountable for my actions, both good and bad, and I enjoyed or suffered the consequences as appropriate. Discipline was administered firmly but fairly. I never doubted the motives of the


faculty or the administrators. Honesty and integrity were foundational. It was a very structured and strict environment, yet our teachers encouraged us to think critically and creatively. All these things have served me well every day of my life and I am deeply grateful.

That was then, but what about now? It's not the same place today that it was then, is it? Well, yes and no. Over the intervening fifty-odd years since my graduation, most of the buildings have been torn down and replaced. All but two of my teachers have passed away. The military program is long gone. Pizza and burgers are available every day in the dining hall. Boarding students can talk to their parents every day whether they want to or not. So no, it's not the same place in many ways. But, in important ways, it's the same place. I continue to support McCallie because, while adapting as necessary to changing times, McCallie has remained true to its foundational principles. It's still a place where boys can not only become men, but good men, and a place where a festering mess of potential, such as I was, can find his footing, shoulder his burden, and do his part to make the world just a bit better.



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Postscript: You may be wondering about my posing with a racing helmet, and what's with the boys standing in front of a car outside Walker Hall. As noted before, I discovered my love of competition at McCallie, and I have sought it in one form or another ever since. Even before McCallie, I felt the need for speed, especially on wheels. My love of competition and my need for speed went their separate ways until, at age 60, I found a way to put them together: car racing. I had always thought about it but had neither the money nor the time to pursue it. But once I had accumulated some wealth and completed my parental obligations, I put my affairs in order and, with the reluctant agreement from my wife Brenda, went racing. I have since achieved considerable success but, more importantly, Brenda has bought in and we have pulled my son into the game. It's a family affair.

Recently, I thought of a way to bring my third passion, McCallie, into the formula. I pitched a plan for a school project: with my financial sponsorship, build a race car and, hopefully, put some boys in it and race (with parental consent and appropriate safety equipment, naturally). Besides being fun, a complex project like building a car requires important life skills,

such as planning, research, organization, coordination, teamwork, task allocation, time management, patience and more. To make a long story short, the program was a hit. Working mostly on their own, the boys got it done. After a professional safety check, we put the car on the track twice for testing. It ran, it went, and it stopped, all quite quickly. Unfortunately, time ran out before we could race it. Those young men and their classmates now have stepped out into the wider world to discover, among other things, the great gifts McCallie has given them. It was my privilege to walk with them on part of their journey.

DISCOVERING LIFE VALUES AND OPPORTUNITY

I am an immigrant. My parents moved to America with very little when I was about 2½ years old; we landed in Nashville, Tennessee. I grew up in a lower middle-class neighborhood where things were not ideal. As an Asian-Indian immigrant, education was a high priority and my dad wanted to give us the best education possible.

Honestly, to this day, I am not exactly sure how I ended up at McCallie, but I do know that through A Better Chance (ABC), we made application to McCallie. In the beginning, my brother, Prasad Kodali '87, was accepted to McCallie as a 4-year boarding student and then, I followed in his footsteps. We were financial aid/scholarship kids.

McCallie showed me there was a lot to discover and learn. There were a lot of students at McCallie that had more resources and connections than we did, but that was a good thing because it showed me that there was real opportunity out there. This instilled in me the drive and desire to work hard.

People at McCallie, like Kenny Sholl, were instrumental in forming my world view and in helping me understand my place in it. Coach Sholl probably underestimates the impact he had on me and other students since, for him, this is just the way he conducts his day-to-day life. As a coach and leader, he is an individual of high integrity. The way he

conducted himself and the Honor Code at McCallie were the two things that really impacted my life. In Coach Sholl, I had a tremendous role model, and today I believe that honesty and integrity are important, no matter what the circumstances.

Boarding for me was an excellent experience. My parents moved to the states when they were in their early 30s. They didn't know what it meant to be an American. Nashville at the time wasn't as cosmopolitan as it is today. My parents were trying to raise an Indian kid in Nashville, TN. This had its own challenges. My parents didn't understand what was cool, or what a teenager in Nashville needs, or desires. Coming to McCallie was a great benefit because McCallie standardized some of the social differences. Everyone wore a uniform. Everyone wore a certain tie, and I had that tie. McCallie helped ease some of the social and cultural pressure that comes with trying to fit in as a teenager. At McCallie, I was able to be a teenager like my peers.

Before McCallie, I never found a group. It always felt like I was on the outside looking in. To some degree, you start to hide your culture and try to adopt other cultures. I don't think I understood any of this until after I left McCallie. But, as an adult, and after having children of my own, I appreciate McCallie giving me the freedom to develop my own ethos and identity.

Learning how to conduct myself and how to be responsible was a tremendous life lesson with which I had a lot of help. The friends I made as a 4-year boarding student are people I call friends to this day. Without the support from a lot of those guys, I don't think I would have become the person I am today.

From McCallie, I went to Wittenberg University in Ohio. I was on the pre-med track, with a major in biology and a minor in philosophy. After graduating Wittenberg University, I got a job doing basic scientific research at Vanderbilt University Medical Center. I worked in the department of Clinical Pharmacology. All kinds of exciting things were happening there, and I was on the path to becoming a doctor.

A pivotal moment in my life occurred while I was working at Vanderbilt. During my time there, I realized that being a doctor wasn't for me. Eventually, I told my parents that I had decided not to be a doctor. For Indian parents, becoming a doctor is a "thing". It was tough. On a whim, I got a GMAT book, took the GMAT, and applied to Vanderbilt along with a few other schools. I ended up going to Vanderbilt for my MBA and graduated with a concentration in finance. During my time at Vanderbilt Graduate School, a McCallie grad helped me get my first internship at Prudential Securities for 8 weeks in New York City for the summer. After that summer internship, I knew I wanted to work on Wall Street. This turn of events changed my life forever.

I have a love for McCallie and a love for New York because they both shaped so much of my experiences and opportunities, my worldview, my social circumstances, and just about everything else in my life. I met my wife in New York, and I can very confidently say that without her, I would not have been able to meet some of the challenges in my career and personal life. She helped me succeed as a person, as a father, and in my career.

My heritage, or rather my understanding and appreciation of my heritage, has evolved over time: time spent in an Indian household with loving parents; time spent at McCallie as a boarding student away from home; time spent in college and graduate school – time spent in New York working on Wall Street, and the incredible experience of marrying an amazing woman, and raising incredible children of my own. Initially, I was not proud of my Indian heritage for a lot of the same reasons that teenagers aren't proud of things in their lives – because of social issues, peer pressure, wanting to fit in, wanting to not always explain who or what you are, to always have people focus on what makes you different. I realized that my Indian heritage is part of who I am and I embraced it.

One of the reasons that I am so interested in supporting McCallie is that it has had a very positive impact on my life and was a sanctuary in a lot of ways. As an environment, McCallie leveled the playing field, educated me, opened my eyes to new experiences, and gave me lifelong friends. To that end, my wife and I have joined the Founders Club this year. The planned gift portion of my commitment will be used to fund a merit-based scholarship. My upfront gift commitment was designated to upgrade and refurbish the baseball stadium

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
