Compass, a multi-grade-level character education program, oromotes leadership opportunities, social connections, and service projects. Students are sorted into houses where eighthgraders serve as leaders, guiding younger students on journeys of self-discovery and spiritual development.

Problem? No problem. From learning how to code in first grade to tackling plastic pollution in sixth, Santa Catalina students learn to openly embrace problems. And become masterful at finding solutions.



As early as PreK, students learn to lead by example and see themselves as effective change makers. Each classroom participates in a Project of Passion and students regularly organize coat and food drives as well as partner with local and international aid organizations.



Our spirituality informs who we are as a school. In Religion classes, students are taught the values of kindness and compassion and loving our neighbors as we love ourselves. This simple truth is reinforced when we come together as a school community each month to celebrate Mass in our Rosary Chapel.



Responsibility for self and others.

Makerspace magic. Marble runs and Rube Goldberg contraptions. Catapults and moving mobiles. Animated shorts and 3D-printed face shields. These are just some of the things Catalina students have imagined, planned, and created in one of our two makerspaces.



Truth: Learning is an action verb.

Catalina students are fully, actively engaged in all they do. Whether it's plotting the life cycle of a painted lady butterfly, examining archetypes in contemporary literature, or puzzling out a complex math problem, our students are fearless and adventurous learners.

Of course, our teachers play a part in that as well. They're passionately committed educators with years of experience. Endless reserves of energy. And an inspired approach to unlocking a love of learning.

Programs that tap into potential

The Orton-Gillingham Approach to Literacy. PreK through first-grade students learn to read, write, and spell through this powerful, multisensory teaching tool.

Math that meets students where they are. Based on placement testing, Leveled Math ensures just the right balance of challenge and success. The Singapore Math method helps students master complicated concepts through an intentional progression of concrete, pictorial, and abstract methods.

Hands-on science learning. Programs like the Full Option Science System and Cambridge Physics Outlet allow for dynamic, inquiry-based study of everything from biology to earth science to engineering.

Spanish starts in fourth. ¿Como se dice "true learning" en Español? Just ask our fourth-graders. They engage with the language daily through conversation, games, and cultural literacy.



Finding balance. Middle School advisory meetings, held three times a week, center around intentional discussions to promote time management and emotional well-being.

To learn is to do – and do, and do. Field trips are a fact of life here, from visits to local organizations to hiking historic California Gold Rush sites to overnight trips in grades four through eight. (An always-popular Middle School trip is traveling to D.C. to meet members of Congress.)

Equally important? Creating immersive academic experiences that make the past (and future) feel like the present.

And, of course, real-time problem solving using a host of hightech, high-touch tools. At Catalina, you'll find our fifth-graders planning a trip to Mars. Sixth-graders building underwater robots. And seventh-graders navigating the political intrigue of ancient Rome.

The arts curriculum at Catalina is organized around three themes: creating art, looking at art, and living with art. Performance opportunities. On average there are five on-campus performances throughout the year, as well as invitations to perform in the community. On-campus facilities include the 150-seat Mary L. Johnson Recital Hall and the 500-seat Sister Carlotta Performing Arts Center.

In-house art museum. Our rotating Art Salon features more than 700 pieces of original artwork by Catalina students.

Private music lessons. It's all part of the school day. Private vocal and instrument lessons are available for grades one through eight.

Instruments for all! More than 40 Orff instruments are available for student use.



Middle School Art Electives. In addition to regular art classes, students can choose from electives like pop art and photography.







Truth: Movement builds skills.

Every day at Catalina is a chance to chase a ball or swing a racket or grab a rebound. On the surface it may look like play, but our approach to physical education strengthens muscles and builds crucial motor skills. It also boosts confidence, instills sportsmanship, and promotes self-discipline.

Middle School students also have the opportunity to compete on seven interscholastic sports teams. Practices are built into the school day and games take place after school. Best of all? Everyone gets a chance to play.





Swimming is big at Catalina. Making swimming part of the P.E. curriculum means students have more opportunities to develop specific strokes, build endurance, improve diving techniques, and practice water safety - all in our competitionsize pool.
